



A Great Challenge Requires a Great Team

I heard the story of a large man who fell into a lake. He flailed in water over his head and hollered for help. He could not swim! A man jumped into the water to help, but the larger man quickly pulled him under the water and nearly drowned his would-be rescuer. A second man dived into the water to help, but also nearly drowned while trying to pull the drowning man out.

A third observer decided to form a human chain. Men and women onshore locked hands and then clasped the hands of those in the water. Finally, one person in the water grasped the hand of the drowning man. As the human chain pulled together, they rescued the man from death.

Each person in the chain was vital to the rescue. Some tasks are impossible without assistance from others. Some challenges are so great they require a team of helpers.

Our general superintendents are challenging Nazarenes globally to give the largest offering in the history of the denomination at Thanksgiving/Harvest time for the World Evangelism Fund (WEF). Challenge 2010, a special WEF PLUS Offering, provides all of us an opportunity to present a love offering beyond our normal WEF giving or Thanksgiving Offering. The WEF PLUS Offering will help keep missionaries on their fields and will reap an abundant harvest of souls worldwide.

Local NMI President, will you lead with your pastor to plan for a record-breaking, world-changing offering? This is possible if everyone pulls together!

Thank you for challenging **every** person in your church to participate in the Challenge 2010 Offering. With Thanksgiving only a few weeks away, please use every opportunity and resource available to you—especially videos—to promote the offering regularly. As you show the videos, please emphasize that if every regular attendee will give at least an extra \$10 for the WEF PLUS Offering, our rescue efforts will succeed. Please utilize the downloadable chart describing the value of \$10 in various economies around the world (see page 3 for *Notes as well as link to download chart).

Today, I was able to make half of that Faith Promise a reality! Same bills to pay; I am just amazed! The money was there, extra money! I don’t know how, but the bill dates were pushed back. God is at work everywhere. Thanks so much for helping God be glorified once again!

* Notes for Attached WEF PLUS National Parity Suggestion and Calculation Chart

Globally, the WEF PLUS goal for each regular attendee is an equivalent of USD 10 beyond normal Thanksgiving/Harvest or Faith Promise giving. USD 10 means 10 dollars (\$10). We have attached a chart to help you calculate an equivalent gift in various countries. The chart considers national exchange rates as well as standards of living.

To see how this works, please note Argentina for an example: The exchange rate between US dollars and Argentina pesos on August 16, 2010, was 3.9293 pesos to \$1. Therefore, \$10 equals 39.293 pesos or rounded to the nearest peso, \$10 equals 40 pesos.

However, this calculation alone does not take into account the difference in wages between someone living in Argentina and someone living in the U.S.A. The average salary of an Argentine is USD \$13,800 as opposed to USD \$46,400 for an average American. Therefore, \$10 has more value to an average Argentine than it has to an average American. Therefore, we made a second calculation we call parity value. The second calculation yields a parity value of 11.69 pesos. The chart then rounds this to 10 pesos. So, the equivalent goal in Argentina would be approximately 10 pesos.

Please feel free to utilize and/or share this chart. It could be another insightful and motivating mission education resource for your congregation well beyond WEF PLUS!

WEF PLUS Global Prayer Initiatives

Canada Thanksgiving—October 11; six preceding Sundays: September 5, 12, 19, 26, October 3, 10

U.S.A. Thanksgiving—November 25; six preceding Sundays: October 17, 24, 31, November 7, 14, 21

1. Global goal: \$6 million to sustain missionaries and our global mission
2. Global prayer: 6 minutes per week for 6 weeks (one minute per day)
3. Global fasting: one meal per week for 6 weeks
4. Global focus: 6 prayer points in evangelism, disciple-making, leadership development, church development, missionary call/care, and compassion
5. Global regions: praying for one region per week for 6 weeks as follows (Canada first; U.S.A. second)
 - Africa: week of September 5 or October 17
 - Asia-Pacific: week of September 12 or October 24
 - Eurasia: week of September 19 or October 31
 - Mexico/Central America/Caribbean: week of September 26 or November 7
 - South America: week of October 3 or November 14
 - USA/Canada: week of October 10 or November 21
6. Global participation: each regular attendee giving at least \$10 (adjusted to reflect national parity) beyond regular WEF, Faith Promise, missions, or Thanksgiving Offering. Some have decided to give one day's earnings for WEF PLUS.

Strategy to Collect Offerings of Thanksgiving

I want to share what we in the Church of the Nazarene Effort II, the city of Cobán, Alta Verapaz, Guatemala, C.A., are conducting.

On the church's altar is placed an offering box for the whole year, where every day or every Sunday, the brothers and sisters place their offerings. For example, when there is an illness and we pray for God to heal and after healing, in an attitude of thankfulness, the brother or sister or family deposits its offering of thanksgiving. Similarly, when a brother or family makes a trip and return from the trip, they place their offering of thanksgiving for having been accompanied by the grace of God. Also, if a student earns a degree or completes a course or ends his course of study, an offering may be given. An offering may be given for any other reason.

A Year-Round LINKS Idea

I am the LINKS person who is to write to folks and take care of birthdays, etc. I am not involved in the children's Sunday School program or children's church. So whenever birthdays are coming up, I go into the classes and have the children sign the appropriate birthday cards for that month. By giving them an item at the beginning of the class, I don't infringe too much into the regular teaching program.

The hospital and missionary kids' (MKs') school in Papua New Guinea (PNG) are our LINKS projects this year.

The first month I gave each child a prayer card with the school children's picture on it, and they signed a couple of cards.

The next time I wanted to leave them with either a picture to color that depicts something in PNG or a simple story about the school, etc., and remind them to continue praying.

I asked for drawings of the hospital, the school, PNG people, animals common to PNG, or things of this nature that I could give the children from time to time.

We sent birthday cards for the first time from the younger group. The children signed the card and then received the prayer card with the MK pictures on them. The cards had magnets on the backs for placing them on the refrigerator.

I also requested photos of the hospital and surrounding grounds. I hope to put onto a poster, along with pictures of the MKs and any letters they might send. There are lots of fun things that can be done throughout a year.

Involving Teens in Mission Services

In preparation for the service, develop questions that will be texted to the youth during the mission service. I usually take my questions from the “Fast Facts” from the lessons. Your church’s tech person will text the questions, using numbers submitted by the youth.

Prior to the service, I distribute the “Fast Facts” to people from the congregation who volunteer to read them at the beginning of the service.

At the same time, we also ask all teens who have cell phones with texting abilities to submit their numbers to the tech person. The tech person enters all the phone numbers as a group into his/her cell phone, so the the questions can be sent at the same time to all.

At a predetermined time during the service, a question is sent via text, and the first teen that texts the right answer wins! He/she gets to pick something out of my basket of prizes.

I do not go over a dollar each for the prizes. It is amazing what teens will do for a pack of gum or their favorite liter of pop or tea. You can also find some really great items in the clearance aisle or dollar store.

This activity as taught me that when I do this the youth pay attention to the whole service. Some of the “Fast Facts” used in the questions also show up in other areas of the lesson.

For those who do not have cell phones or no texting, they are given a separate set of questions. The person running PowerPoint or media types and projects a question on the screen for these students. The first to stand up with the right answer also wins. The media person also projects the correct answer, along with the name of the teen, if known.

Brushing-up on CCK Information

When introducing Crisis Care Kits (CCKs) to your church or mission group, please keep in mind that not everyone knows the history of this meaningful ministry. Explain what CCKs are, what they do, why they are important, and where they have provided ministry to people. The following can be used as a script for an announcement from the pulpit for churches in the U.S.A., and a variation may be created for Canada's Personal Care Kits.

Buy enough two-gallon bags to achieve your CCK goal, and copy enough CCK inventories (www.nazarenemissions.org/Stories/docs/Giving/Compassion/cckinventory.pdf) to fill the bags.

Crisis Care Kits (CCKs) are a cooperative effort between Nazarene Compassionate Ministries Incorporated (NCMI) and Nazarene Missions International (NMI) meeting needs around the world. In 2009, CCKs were shipped to Ethiopia, Haiti, Sri Lanka, Zambia, and Ukraine for use in disaster relief, evangelism, and compassionate ministry centers. Your generosity made an incredible difference!

Each local church is challenged to donate enough kits to fill at least one banana box (six CCKs per banana box), and small churches may combine efforts to fill banana boxes. The CCK emphasis will be December (NMI's month of emphasis for Nazarene Compassionate Ministries); however, kits may be received year-round and people are encouraged to provide kits when disasters occur around the world so quantities will be sufficient. When disasters happen, CCKs are shipped from the warehouses immediately, so new CCKs are needed to replace them.

CRISIS CARE KITS

We have provided two-gallon bags with the CCK inventory already inserted. If you are willing to fill one, please take a bag. We will also need money to ship the banana boxes from our church to the nearest warehouse, as well as \$12.00 per banana box that provides storage and shipping costs during the distribution process.

Thank you for helping us help others by filling a Crisis Care Kit or two or three by (date the CCKs should be returned).

After receiving the CCKs, follow the CCK preparation document (www.nazarenemissions.org/Stories/docs/Giving/Compassion/cckinstructions.pdf) and ship your banana boxes to the appropriate location.

Han and Corry Tan are members of the Amersfoort Church of the Nazarene in the Netherlands. Han is a family doctor. A few years ago he specialized in manual health care. Corry is a nurse. For a long time, they worked in their practice in the fast-growing town of Houten.

Several times, during furlough they have gone to the mission field in Nepal, India, and Swaziland to supply medical care.

Two years ago they decided to close their successful practice. They started working with another medical doctor from the same church in his practice in the rural village of Woudenberg. This decision gave them the opportunity to have three months a year free from work and to dedicate their time to serve the Lord and people by going to the mission field to provide health care where it is needed.

Last year they went to Bangladesh and Sri Lanka with NCM and were able to help a quite a number of children who suffered from diseases. Many of the diseases were related to nutrition.

Living Mission Sponsorships Reported

According to a recent report from Nazarene Compassionate Ministries (NCM) and JESUS Film Harvest Partners (JFHP), this convention season's sponsorship challenge by the two ministries resulted in 115 JFHP sponsorships and 304 Child Sponsorships for NCM. Those churches sponsoring at least one of each received *Living Mission* free, and for those churches that sponsored 2 or more of each received *Living Mission*, as well as the children's mission education curriculum and the youth mission education curriculum. A total of 74 churches benefitted from the sponsorship challenge, receiving one or more of the curricula. Many other churches participated in one of the ministries' sponsorships. Thanks you so much for your generosity.

Second Living Mission Shipment Mailed

Cholera Outbreak Threatens Haiti, Church Provides Clean Water Systems

Waves of disaster continue in Haiti with mid-October's cholera outbreak in the Artibonite region. Cholera, a disease passed through contaminated water and improperly cooked food, causes extreme and acute diarrhea that leads to rapid dehydration. If the dehydration is not combated by proper fluid intake, cholera results in death. As of October 25, 2010, an estimated 259 people have died from the recent outbreak of the disease.

Limited almost exclusively to the Artibonite region, officials believe the outbreak is a result of recent rains that caused the Artibonite River to overflow its banks. Currently, only five cases have been reported in Port-au-Prince, each instance from someone from the Artibonite region.

Many relief agencies, including the Red Cross, Doctors Without Borders, and the World Health Organization, have responded to the needs of the sick as well as prevention for the healthy. Cholera can be prevented with clean drinking water and properly cooked food. In this insecure time, however, many Haitians are afraid to drink water since it might be contaminated. But the lack of fluids can compromise those who have already contracted the rapidly dehydrating disease. Safe water for communities is critical at this point.

The Church of the Nazarene responded immediately to the outbreak in the Lower Artibonite and North Central districts by sending 200 doses of antibiotics, hand sanitizer, 30 cases of water, gloves, and personal hygiene products.

Dr. Lucien Jean Baptiste, the national leader for the Church of the Nazarene in Haiti, said, "It is important for Nazarenes everywhere to continue to pray for the people of Haiti during this health crisis."

Church leaders are also accelerating the already existing clean water campaigns. The church will be giving biosand filters to every Nazarene church and school in Haiti. Biosand filters use slow sand filtration technology to remove bacteria, viruses, and particles from water making it safe for drinking. Church leaders are continuing to meet with the areas' district superintendents to monitor the situation closely and be prepared for further shipments and intervention as the need arises.
