Urgent Call for All Christians to Pray for 10/40 Window Nations

As I write this feature, global media is announcing that a renowned terrorist and persecutor of Christians has been apprehended and executed. Also, the following story is reported by nearly every news media and mission ministry globally:

Please pray that the Lord spares the life of Iranian Pastor Youcef Nadarkhani. He is “the head of a network of Christian house churches in Iran” and “could be executed in Tehran for refusing to recant his religious beliefs and convert to the dominant religion in Iran. according to media reports.

Please pray the Lord uses this pastor and others like him to encourage Iranian believers to stand strong for Jesus Christ. Pray, too, that the gospel message would spread throughout Iran and the epicenter as a result of the international pressure for Pastor Youcef's release and that many would be saved.

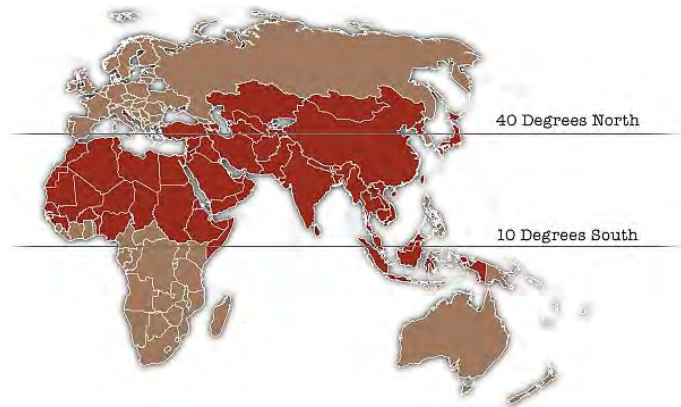

About the 10/40 Window

The 10/40 Window is located from 10 degrees south to 40 degrees north of the equator. There are **69 nations** across northern Africa, the Middle East and Central Asia in the 10/40 Window. Nearly 4 billion people live here, including 90 percent of the world's poorest of the poor. It is estimated that 1.6 billion of these people have never had the chance to hear the Gospel of Jesus Christ - not even once! The seat of every major non-Christian religion – Islam, Buddhism, Hinduism, Animism, Atheism, and Sikhism - is headquartered in the 10/40 Window.

1. Two-thirds of the world's population — 4 billion people — live in the 10/40 Window.
2. 95 percent of these 4 billion people are **unevangelized**.
3. 87 percent are the poorest of the poor, living on an average of only \$250 per family annually.
4. In many of the **69 nations**, witnessing the Christian Gospel is illegal and will result in imprisonment or death.
5. 45 of the 50 worst countries in the world for persecution of Christians are in the 10/40 Window.
6. Child prostitution and child slavery run rampant in many of these nations.
7. Horrific abuse of women and children remains unchecked, including an epidemic of **pedophilia**.
8. A majority of the world's terrorist organizations are based in the 10/40 Window, and children as young as 18 months old are trained to be Jihad soldiers.



Though the needs are both and desperate and urgent, **only 5 cents out of every \$100 US** spent on missions globally is directed toward the 10/40 Window. That is **0.0005 percent** of all mission money designated to offer the gospel to **66 percent** of the world's population!

This year, NMI cooperates with WIN to promote the International Day of Prayer for the Persecuted Church on November 13. Please encourage every local church to participate in special prayer that day. Now is the time to prepare; please do not delay. To simplify, **I have drawn prayer resources from the WIN Web site for you to pass on rapidly**. Because You Give – Portrait of a Pastor

As a child, Philip Lahai Kenneey lived in Liberia until war broke out. His father was murdered, and the rest of his family scattered in fear. Not knowing where his siblings or mom were, Philip hid and slept amongst dead bodies for three days before slipping on board a ship headed to Ghana.

Life in Ghana didn't go well. The family that took him in forced him to do odd jobs to bring in money, one job almost killed him. Philip left and didn't look back; he was only seven years old.

Even as he slept in bus stations and on the streets, Philip's priority was his education. Any money earned was split between education costs and food. Philip lived this way for nine years; and during this time, he felt that God was far away, yet he often prayed.

After entering secondary school, Philip's lack of funds would not allow him to continue. When students went home for Christmas, Philip had nowhere to go, so he slept in an uncompleted structure and bathed in stagnant water.

One day while washing up, he met Pastor Frank Mills, his English teacher. When Pastor Mills asked Philip why he hadn't gone home for the holidays, the boy did not respond. The pastor invited him to his church, a Nazarene church.

Later Pastor Mills invited Philip to his home, then the pastor and his wife invited him to live with them.

The Milles paid for school fees and cared for Philip until he completed high school.

Philip was so happy in his new home and regularly attended church. He accepted Christ as Savior and began preaching the Gospel. He went through church leadership classes and became an assistant pastor. Eventually, when Pastor Mills accepted another assignment, Philip became the senior pastor.

When a Work & Witness team came to Philip's town, they learned of his story and prayed for him to be reunited with his family in Liberia. The team raised funds for travel and within two weeks Philip reconnected with his mother, brothers and sisters in Liberia. He says, "God is good and wonderful. He is bigger than all our problems. He comes to us in His own time."

Nazarenes who give to the World Evangelism Fund (WEF) participate in the lives of people like Philip. God's grace and WEF made it possible for Philip Lahai Kenneey from Liberia to be reunited with his biological family, to lead a church family, and to be in the family of God. WEF makes a difference!

The International Day of Prayer for the Persecuted Church (IDOP) 2011, is Sunday, November 13 (Sunday, November 6 in the U.K. and Ireland); however, you are free to choose another date in November if you wish to join in prayer in this global, annual event to pray for the suffering church worldwide.

There are many countries in the world today where Christians are persecuted for their faith. Believers in some countries face death threats. Christians in many other countries around the world face violence,

imprisonment, discrimination and actual death. There are thousands of Christians who have fled their homes and countries due to persecution; and some places are so closed off from the world that persecution take place, but goes unknown to the outside world.

-  Would you like to receive text alerts on your mobile device when we post a new *Engage* story or article? You can get them from our Twitter page. If you don't have a Twitter account, you can set one up at Twitter.com. Then visit www.twitter.com/Engagemagazine, and click on the symbol of a mobile phone to begin registering your device. (This is available in countries supported by Twitter's text alert option; look for your country on their list.) -  The Kansas City District NMI (under the leadership of Eunice Brubaker), in collaboration with other NMI DPs, has developed "Focus Team Ministry Descriptions" for district and local councils that cover the four NMI core objectives: Praying, Giving, Discipling, and Educating. While you likely have your councils organized and running smoothly, the ministry descriptions are a great example to review and forward to churches who may need to restructure their councils.
-  Music is often a prominent part of mission services. Many people may be unaware of the requirements of copyright law. When using lyrics and/or music of a copyrighted song, the copyright information and CCLI license number should always be included with any lyrics and/or music reproduced. The copyright information may be printed in a small font; it just needs to be there. See the following information regarding what is acceptable for reproducing songs without a CCLI number: www.pdinfo.com/copyrt.php.) The proper way to document the CCLI number is:

Title," words and music by (lyricist and composer) © (copyright year) (copyright holder) Used By Permission. CCLI License # _____

The person who will be leading the music should have access to the needed information if the song is registered with CCLI. However, if the song is not registered, the copyright information should still be posted, so it may involve some research. If the music is used in a service setting where multiple churches are participating, the CCLI number should be of the host church or music leader's church. These requirements are according to copyright law in the U.S.A. NMI leaders living in other countries should research the laws in those locations.
