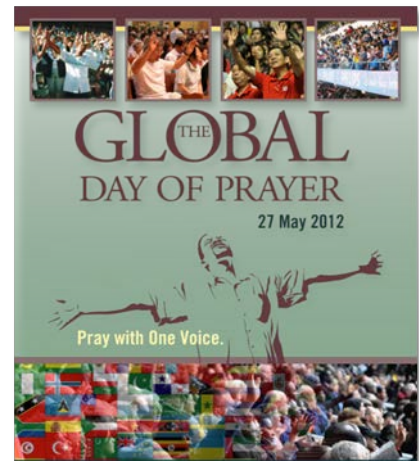
In the year 2000, God captured the heart of a South African Christian businessman, Graham Power, with a vision based on 2 Chronicles 7:14 to call Christians in South Africa from all denominations into a Day of Repentance and Prayer. In 2001, more than 45,000 Christians united for a Day of Repentance and Prayer at a stadium in Cape Town. It was a day of intense intercession that transformed lives and was reflected in a changing city in the months to come.

In 2002, Graham Power had a second vision for the whole of Africa to gather in a Day of Repentance and Prayer, changing Africa to become a "light to the world". Eventually, Africa was to invite all the nations of the globe to unite in this move of transformational prayer.

At the same time, different prayer streams from across the globe were flowing in the same direction with a similar vision of community transformation through prayer. God was raising up a church of intercession in order to prepare communities for the revelation of His glory.

Since then, Christians from all 56 nations of Africa participated in the first ever continental Day of Repentance and Prayer for Africa (May 2004) and Christians from 156 nations participated. In May 2009, the initiative miraculously expanded to 220 countries in the world. Together with the 10 days leading up to and the 90 days of blessing following the Global Day of Prayer, there was a sense that the call to unity and repentance was deepening. This laid the foundation for God to fill the nations with His glory as His children from around the world cried out to him in unity.

The growing momentum of these 12 years has laid the foundation to saturate nations in prayer. It is time to shift focus from 220 nations to facilitate a lifestyle of prayer with as many people in as many places as possible. In this new season, we no longer aim at having organized events in every single country of the world. We need to increase the number of gatherings on Pentecost Sunday in smaller settings such as local churches, family homes, and businesses beyond stadiums and assembly halls.



To NMI's frontline prayer warriors, please encourage your churches to join Christians around the world for the Global Day of Prayer May 27, 2012. Join me in praying that we will see the fulfillment of Habakkuk 2:14: "For the earth will be filled with the knowledge of the glory of the Lord as the waters cover the sea."

## JESUS Film "Let It Rain!" A story from the NMI Prayer Vision Journey Team

A group of 35 Nazarene Missions International (NMI) leaders from the U.S.A., Canada, and Trinidad and Tobago traveled recently to Sri Lanka and India to pray and partner with local Nazarenes in a Prayer Vision Journey. One stop was to pray during a JESUS Film showing on a tea estate in Sri Lanka. The village square was immediately adjacent to the temple.

The skies were gray and cloudy. The glow of lightning and sounds of thunder rolled over the central square as the film began. Many of the team prayed that rain would not dampen the evening and keep people from watching JESUS.

Many team members sat on rocky steps of humble homes surrounding the village square. As the film began, the sound system amplified the story of JESUS in the Tamil language. People on the side of a hill turned on their lights and stepped outside to see the source of the sound. They began watching JESUS that night.

About halfway through the showing a light rain began. Several of the visiting team members went to prayer, asking God to stop the rain.

"The rain only increased, and we sensed God saying that He had the situation covered and was doing something greater," noted Ann Baldwin, a member of the global NMI office team who was with the group.

What the visiting Prayer Vision Journey team did not know was that it had not rained in this area for three months. The priests and followers of the local traditional religion had been praying for days and weeks, making sacrifices, wailing and crying out for rain to their many gods. In fact, earlier in the afternoon, some of the village's women had been in the village temple beside that very square, pleading with their gods to send rain.



During the scene in which Jesus was nailed on the cross, the heavens broke loose and rain poured down over the gathering.

The group was told that when the rain came during the crucifixion of Christ, the villagers said they knew that Jesus is the God who hears and answers prayers, that He is the God who brings the healing rains so needed by that village.

NMI Office team member Rob North had the opportunity to pray with a new believer named Reuben, who had brought his father and his best friend, James, to the front of the crowd to invite Jesus into their lives that night. "I prayed as the rain poured over us, washing the dust and dirt off our earthly bodies, that the Blood of Christ would flow over these new believers, cleansing them from the inside out," North said. "I prayed for their safety, imagining the challenges coming their way as they walk this new journey with Christ."

Baldwin said that a young boy approached her and nodded when she asked if she could pray with him. While she knew that he would not understand her prayer in English, she says, "God directed me to pray that what he had seen that evening in the JESUS film would be made known to him through the work of the Holy Spirit and through follow up of the local film team."

North said he believes the fruited yielded that night will be abundant because Jesus captivated those who remained. The rain solidified His life-transforming gift that He gave each of us by dying on the cross and conquering death three days later. Let it rain!

## Highlights: 89<sup>th</sup> General Board Session, Global Mission, and the Global Council of Nazarene Missions International

In February 2012 the 89<sup>th</sup> session of the General Board, Global Mission, and the Global Council of Nazarene Missions International met. The meetings saw dedicated mission leaders retire and the approval of new global missionaries. Many items were discussed and decided upon. Highlights from the meetings can be found in a downloadable document in this newsletter.

Of utmost importance to NMI, Daniel shared the following action plan goals for 2012.

1. Increase the number of local NMIs globally by 15 percent or 2,350 churches. During 2011, we added 10 percent or 1,474 churches globally.

2. Increase NMI members globally by 15 percent or 150,000 members. During 2011, we added 1 percent or 14,350 members globally.

3. Praying: renew prayer with fasting as a priority and engage intercessors globally.
4. Praying: challenge each local church to pray for persecuted Christians globally and regularly.
5. Praying: explore potential for a Web-based interactive global prayer wall.
6. Discipling future mission leaders: initiate and sustain an active mission call coordinator in each district NMI, a process to disciple students called, and an improved database system.
7. Discipling future mission leaders: equip at least 40 students called to missions during Mission Immersion Kenya 2012.
8. Giving: increase to 35 percent the number of churches and districts giving the World Evangelism Fund at 5.5 percent. During 2011, 25 percent of churches and districts gave the World Evangelism Fund in full.
9. Giving: increase by 10 percent offerings for Alabaster, Missionary Care, and Broadcast.
10. Giving: send handwritten thank you notes to district presidents and superintendents globally who give the World Evangelism Fund at 5.5 percent and 5.7 percent.
11. Educating: align themes of *Living Mission* and NMI mission books.
12. Educating: add 25 percent online *Living Mission* resources.
13. Educating: implement the marketing plan for *Living Mission* more proactively in at least every English-speaking market globally.
14. Educating: develop plans to achieve 20,000 subscriptions for *Mission Connection*.
15. Educating: develop plans to achieve 20,000 subscriptions for *Engage Magazine*.
16. Educating: release at least one World Evangelism Fund-specific story per month in *Engage Magazine*.
17. Educating: send at least four exclusive stories for pastors before we publish them in *Engage*.
18. Educating: complete Prayer Vision Journey India and Sri Lanka with at least 30 district NMI leaders.
19. Partnerships: challenge NMI leaders to help inspire and promote church partnerships in at least 75 churches.
20. Recruit, equip, and deploy at least seven office volunteers for the global NMI office.

## Mission Corps (MC) Guidelines For Personal Gifts

In the February issue of *HeartLine*, NMI published an update on LINKS, which gave new policy about LINKS giving in accordance with IRS guidelines. This month we detail below more information about personal gifts to Mission Corps missionaries. Please forward the information to your churches. (February's LINKS Update, has been included in the downloadables section for your information. The Mission Corps Guidelines is also included in the downloadables.)

### Mission Corps (MC) Guidelines For Personal Gifts

This document summarizes how to differentiate between true personal gifts and personal gifts that the IRS considers compensation.

Non-church solicited personal gifts (non-taxable, non-compensation transactions):

There are no IRS regulations that prohibit the General Church from using its existing infrastructure to transfer personal gifts from individuals and churches to MC personnel. This involvement on the part of the General Church does not affect the nature of the funds being transferred, i.e., those funds remain a personal gift from the giver to the MC personnel receiving the gift.

Church solicited personal gifts (taxable, compensation transactions): If the General Church, in any fashion, gets involved in soliciting or encouraging personal gifts for individuals, IRS regulations have determined that these gifts take on the characteristics of compensation. LINKS gifts, obviously, meet the definition of a church solicited gift. As volunteers, MCs cannot receive any compensation without violating the guidelines the IRS has set for volunteers. Thus, MCs cannot receive LINKS gifts personally.

Church solicited support gifts (non-taxable, non-compensation reimbursement of qualifying expenses): However, LINKS gifts can be placed into the MCs support account without violating the volunteer nature of their relationship with the General Church. In such a

case, the LINKS gift is not given to an individual, but is given instead to the church (the support accounts are under the full control of the church), and as long as the standard IRS rules of usage of these accounts are followed, distribution from these support accounts remains a non-compensation, non-taxable event. The IRS has established specific guidelines that determine what expenses incurred by the volunteer in their service to the General Church can be reimbursed to them without becoming taxable compensation.

While it might sound like a minor technicality to those not affected by this differentiation, this has significant impact on MC missionaries. IRS guidelines for non-compensation, reimbursable expenses are somewhat limiting. Therefore, the vast majority of expenses that MC missionaries might incur while in service of the General Church can be reimbursed from their MC support account.

However, there are still several important categories that are legitimate and necessary expenses for the MC that are not covered. Some of the more common expenses that MCs incur that cannot be reimbursed from their support accounts include school loan payments, education of their children, medical expenses not covered by insurance, and personal hygiene-type items. Unfortunately, LINKS gifts cannot be used by MCs to meet these types of expenses. MCs must rely on personal gifts that have not been solicited by the General Church to meet expenses in these categories.

As mentioned above, the General Church can help facilitate the delivery of such personal gifts to MC missionaries, but the General Church cannot solicit such gifts for them. Once the General Church gets involved in soliciting a gift, the only means of providing that gift to MCs is via their MC support account.

### India Census 2011 – A story discovered by the NMI Prayer Vision Journey Team

While on NMI's Prayer Vision Journey in March 2012, several team members found a copy of the Hindi Times at the airport and read a fascinating article that summarized India's 2011 Census. Of particular interest was the fact that millions of Indians have access to state-of-the-art technologies, but a large number lack access to the most rudimentary facilities.

We encourage you to take a few moments, read the Census Report (which is in the downloadable resources section) and consider how the church can effectively share the Gospel in India and other countries with similar census data.

## Buddy Plan Offering

We encourage your district a Buddy Plan Offering during or around your 2012 district NMI convention. Please encourage pastors and presidents to come prepared to participate in the Approved Mission Special.


The Buddy Plan funds will be distributed to delegates in Global Mission regions to help defray their Global NMI Convention costs. Your offering will make the difference for international delegates. Most global districts can offer very little financial assistance for their delegates, plus international travel adds much to the cost for delegates. The delegates raise funds by selling homemade items, raising pigs for sale, or holding musical concerts and events. As soon as possible, please remind your local presidents to receive a generous Buddy Plan offering. The Global NMI Council will determine an equitable distribution of funds for international delegates. (We will **not** promote an additional Buddy Plan **Plus** Offering this time.)


For the 2005 General NMI Convention, districts gave a total of \$103,826 for Buddy Plan. That offering helped 298 NMI delegates from 6 World Mission regions. For the 2009 General NMI Convention, districts gave \$109,454 for Buddy Plan. Those offerings subsidized 512 delegates from six World Mission regions.


To assist at least 500 delegates in 2013, the Global NMI Council revised/increased the goal to \$125,000. We need every district to give beyond their 2009 offering by about 15 percent to reach the goal. Please review how much your district churches gave to Buddy Plan for 2009, report that to your district churches, and encourage **each local church** to give 15 percent more for 2013.

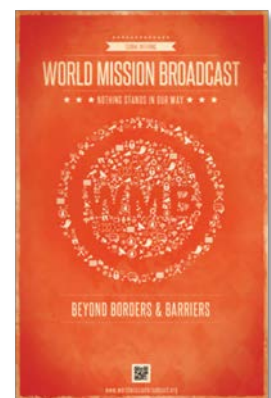

## New Office of Advancement and Development – Partners with NMI in Raising WEF

On 3 April 2012, the Board of General Superintendents was pleased to announce the appointment of Dr. Dan Schafer as the executive director of the Office of Advancement and Development. This new office will be located in the Global Ministry Center and will serve as an arm of the Office of the Board of General Superintendents.

The Office of Advancement and Development is designed to facilitate the coordination and collaboration of all fund-raising activities of the General Church. Another aim of this office is to significantly increase field partnerships and to train missionaries and pastors in cooperation with regions, districts, and local churches. Rev. Marty Hoskins will be joining the team as director of field partnerships.

Dr. Schafer affirmed the responsibility of NMI to help raise the World Evangelism Fund and Approved Mission Specials, saying, "Through the years, NMI has excelled in rallying Nazarenes to invest their time, talent, and resources in reaching our world in the name of Jesus. Our Church would not be where we are today without the thousands of faithful individual servants of Christ who are NMI. We cannot advance to where we need to be tomorrow without the continued and valuable commitment of NMI to mobilize the necessary resources to fulfill the mission our Lord has given to our Church."

In addition to his new responsibilities, Dr. Schafer will continue to provide leadership in the area of Global Mission finance. Rev. Hoskins will continue to provide leadership with Global Mission Personnel.
